

About the North Carolina Literary and Historical Association

On September 18, 1900, a group of men met in Raleigh to establish an organization to encourage literary and historical activity in North Carolina. The North Carolina Literary and Historical Association was founded and its purposes were "to stimulate the production of literature in our state," and "to collect and preserve historical material." The Literary and Historical Association facilitated the founding of the agency that would later become the Office of Archives and History. Illustrious North Carolinians have led the organization through the years, including Justice Walter Clark; R.D.W. Connor, first archivist of the United States; and authors Paul Green and Inglis Fletcher.

Members of the North Carolina Literary and Historical Association receive the quarterly *Historical Review* and annual *Literary Review* as benefits of membership. A limited number of individual copies of the April 2018 (Blackbeard) issue of the *Historical Review* and 2018 issue of the *Literary Review* are available for purchase.



About the Federation of North Carolina Historical Societies


